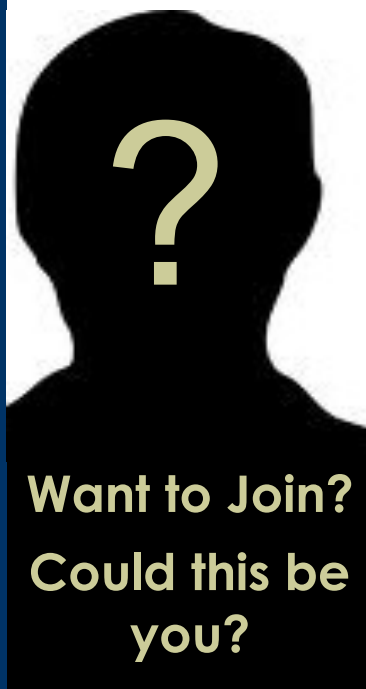

Jimmy Lannon....Living his dream!



Jimmy Lannon came to the Adult Education Service in September 2006 and started his learning journey on a General Art Programme; he then progressed from City & Guilds to Pre-Access and completed his learning with the Service on the Access to Higher Education Art and Design Diploma. He is currently in his third year at the University of Wolverhampton studying on the BA Fine Art degree course. This inspirational exhibition celebrated the distance

travelled by Jimmy on his journey from adult education and beyond!

Jimmy said, "Experimentation with the process and materials that I use has been a key factor in the development of my practice. This allows me more freedom to explore techniques in applying the paint to the canvas, and the different paints I use. When I start a new piece of work I don't set out with an initial idea of what I want to achieve, this depends a lot on chance. My paintings may resemble something or they may not, but that's not important. When I stumble on an interesting technique I just create a few in that style then continue with more experimentation. I look for inspiration in nature, architecture and in urban environmental decay. I tend not to look for influences in other artists, but there have been a few that have helped me understand my own practice more. These artists are: Gerhard Richter, Calum Innes and Ian Davenport.

When I first started studying at Wolverhampton Adult Education Service I'd recently come off Incapacity Benefit, I was lacking in confidence and self-belief. The tutors and staff were very patient; they supported and encouraged me with my study. After a long time of recovery and study, my confidence began to grow and I started to believe in myself. Eventually I was encouraged by my tutors to go to University, and am now in my final year of my BA in Fine Art at Wolverhampton University. This is why I've chosen to do my first solo exhibition here to show my appreciation for all the support I received, and to say thank you to all the staff for helping me to fulfil my dream."

Property Services' Hidden Talent

The Right Worshipful, the Mayor of Wolverhampton, Councillor Christine Mills, hosted a brief ceremony to hand over a portrait of Councillor Bert Turner painted when he was Mayor of Wolverhampton. Councillor Phil Page and Christina Gibbon, the Headteacher of Wilkinson Primary School, were also in attendance.

During 2011-12 when he was Mayor, Councillor Bert Turner, Labour Member representing Bilston East Ward, was approached by Lee Thomson, Senior Architectural Technician in Wolverhampton City Council's Property Services division, to enquire if he would be interested in having his portrait painted by Lee. Lee is a keen artist in his spare time, specialising in portrait painting.

Once the portrait was complete Wolverhampton Adult Education Service asked if one of their learners would be interested in framing the portrait. Harry Rayner, Learners' Council Chair, who attended Picture Framing, Mount Cutting and 3D Picture Sculpture in 2011-12, offered his services.

The portrait will be hung in pride of place in the newly built Wilkinson Primary School, in appreciation of Councillor Turner's services as Chair of Governors on Wilkinson Primary School's Governing Body for many years.

The original Wilkinson School premises, and all resources and records, were destroyed in an arson attack in October 2010. Since that time the school has been operating in temporary accommodation, a cluster of prefabricated buildings situated within the school grounds. Work is due to commence shortly on a replacement school building, with completion anticipated in September 2013.

Councillor Bert Turner said "I am very proud to have had this portrait done. It's wonderful to know that we have such talent among the Council's staff. I feel very honoured that Wilkinson School have asked for it to be hung there and I would like to thank the Headteacher for agreeing to this."

Lee Thomson has since been commissioned to paint a portrait of ex-Councillor Paddy Bradley in recognition of her many years as Councillor for Penn Ward.



European Day of Languages

On 26th September a range of events across Europe celebrated the 230 languages in use throughout the continent as part of the 11th European Day of Languages festivities. Here in Wolverhampton, with 60 different languages spoken across the city, the Adult Education Service marked the day with free classes in different languages and information sessions throughout the week. Councillor Phil Page, Cabinet Member for Schools Skills and Learning, joined the British Sign Language taster session to open the event and brush up on his skills.

Art lovers will be 'Inspired by...' Bill's work

A well-known adult learner from Wolverhampton is inspiring art lovers after contributing to a prestigious show at London's Victoria and Albert (V&A) Museum.

Bill Dixon's work, 'Midsummer Night' a large scale sculpture flanked by two poems on the subject, has been included in 'Inspired by...' the V&A's annual art competition for people undertaking part-time art courses.

Entrants were tasked with creating a piece inspired by the collections of either V&A South Kensington or the V&A Museum of Childhood, and the winning artwork, including Bill's, is now on display.

Bill, who is 79, has been attending Adult Education Service classes for 30 years, studying a whole host of disciplines including ceramics, drawing, painting, print making, languages, history and poetry, as well as an Access to Higher Education

Diploma in Art and Design. He went on to achieve a fine art and sculpture degree at the University of Wolverhampton but still continues to learn his craft with the Adult Education Service.

He was introduced to the competition by Ceramics Club Class facilitator Lorraine Stant from Wolverhampton Adult Education Service, who encouraged her learners to create work to submit.

Bill said, "For over 30 years I have always found the Adult Education Service to be very open, welcoming and encouraging in whatever subject you select. Studying has rejuvenated me and helped keep me young."

Councillor Phil Page, Wolverhampton City Council's Cabinet Member for Schools, Skills and Learning, said, "Bill is an inspiration to us all and a role model to demonstrate the benefits of lifelong learning. Exhibiting at the V&A is a great honour."
