Visually Impaired Provision



During the past 3 years, six learners have achieved Entry level qualifications, seven level 1 and two have completed full level 2 qualifications. One of the learners has now progressed to become an employee and works as an additional support worker in the class.

In September 2008, Braille classes were also started to complement the ICT classes so that learners could learn to read Braille exercises and so make learning more independent. This has also enabled learners to join other classes such as cookery where they can use these skills to create Braille shopping lists and recipe instructions.

In July 2008, the Adult Education Service won a bid for funding from NIACE which allowed us to replace old ICT equipment and also invest in new technology such as scanners, up-to-date JAWS software and plectalk machines which provide portable access to digital information from CDs or pen drives, again making learning for the visually impaired more enjoyable and accessible.

Jim Wright said, "Some four or five years ago I decided to increase my level of self dependency and so embarked upon an ECDL course of seven modules. This has allowed me to write letters, perform and record financial data, surf the internet, send and receive email, together with downloading music and listening to radio programmes etc. My level of independence has increased greatly through the help and guidance resulting from this Adult Education Service course, but of course you need competent and highly skilled people to explain and teach the material to you.

"I look forward to the course continuing and flourishing so that many more blind and visually impaired persons will be able to enjoy the same computer skills as those afforded to sighted people. As for me I look forward to continuing with more advanced material and getting to grips with Windows 7 and MS office 2007/2010."

The Wolverhampton Adult Education Service remains committed to supporting learners who are visually impaired with ICT provision for 2010/2011. This provision has now made the move to The Maltings building which is fully DDA compliant, allowing visually impaired learners with multiple disabilities to attend.

The skills include:

- Building confidence
- Accessing news and information via the Internet
- Communicating with friends and relatives via email
- Learning to use screen reading software which helps to develop independence through reading and writing their own mail
- Gaining employability skills and qualifications

A Tribute to Keith Farley

My friend Keith Farley spent his early childhood on Underhill Estate, Wolverhampton and attended its local primary school. His parents were thrilled when he was awarded a place at the Wolverhampton Grammar school but he always removed his school cap and tie well before reaching home territory for security reasons. His new school badge held no kudos amongst the other lads on the estate!



Before joining the Grammar School he had his musical 'road to Damascus' moment on hearing Elvis Presley for the first time and that love of popular music remained a huge part of his life. Perhaps only those who were young in those dull post-war years can appreciate the impact that American Rock and Roll had at that time.

You could not fail to notice Keith in class with his tight, wrinkled trousers, winkle picker shoes and his mop of blond hair, swept back in Billy Fury style. He was often a rebel and that edginess remained part of his personality.

In our 6th Form days we went on trips to Birmingham Town Hall to see some of the first rock concerts starring the greats such as Little Richard, Jerry Lee Lewis, Gene Vincent and Chuck Berry.

After graduating from Leicester University, Keith quickly established himself as a gifted history teacher with the ability to bring his subject alive and motivate children of all abilities. In time he became a Head of Department and History Advisor for Wolverhampton schools.


In later years he moved into Adult Education where he continued to inspire students at all levels. He was a founder member and first Chairman of the local History and Heritage Society and enjoyed researching his infamous quizzes.

On my retirement he encouraged me to join his WEA Friday class and I immediately recognised his talent for creating a learning environment which made everyone feel valued. His quirky scrapbook approach to history was ideal for our group. We learned much about Wolverhampton: its heroes and heroines, blue plaques, industrial roots and its renowned music scene of the 1960s. His style was informal yet highly informative and he had a gift for getting people to engage and interact, making the sessions often gloriously funny.

Keith was taken seriously ill last December but rather than allow the group to fold, we decided to keep it running under the tutorship of Ned Williams, by offering sessions led by members, sharing their own historical knowledge and interests. Keith was very touched that we had chosen to do this.

His death in March was sudden and unexpected but he had used the last few months to complete another of his popular books on the local rock scene in the 1960s. This partly autobiographical piece was published shortly after his death and is a cracking good read! This, his final legacy, from a well respected and much missed tutor.

Hungarian Exchange



Three members of staff from Wolverhampton Adult Education Services English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) department went to Kobanya, Budapest in early November to monitor and evaluate the **Leonardo Project** (European project providing work placements for English language teaching assistants in Hungary and Poland).

During their visit they delivered a seminar on 'Innovative ways of teaching English' that looked at how technology can be an aid to the learning process and how the tutors can use technology to support the children's English language development. Bruce Parsons and his team were interviewed at the seminar by a local news programme that later appeared on local Hungarian TV.

During the visit in November Bruce and his team were invited to the Houses of Parliament in Budapest by the MP for Kobanya – Mr Revesz Mariusz. The MP stressed his commitment to the project. A further meeting took place with the Mayor and Deputy Mayor of Kobanya, who also re-iterated that the local council remains supportive of the project and that they value the work being done by the teaching assistants from Wolverhampton.

Back in England the Leonardo Project was nominated for the Wulfruna Awards and was awarded a certificate, being 'Highly Commended' by Wolverhampton City Council for 'Exceptional Cross Boundary Partnership Working'.

The Service would like to congratulate the ESOL department for their achievements.


